This is difficult. I feel torn. Our summers offer a narrow window of opportunity. Not every summer asks for this, I tell myself, but this summer asks, and...it is important that I listen. And so I will, as much as I am able with a blooming garden tugging at me.

INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN

Since January it looked as if there very likely would be a settled minister in place at UUCGT in September. This has not come about and the Ministerial Search Committee needs an additional year to complete its work. Therefore, I have accepted the Board's offer to be here a second interim year.

From my perspective, this is a promising development. I spent this first year here mainly trying to ascertain what issues and opportunities require attention and I was aware that, after such things were identified, there would be little time left to work on them.

However, now there is opportunity to approach matters less as an observer and more as an intentional facilitator helping to resolve them. Rather than you and me merely bequeathing a "to do" list to your new minister next year, some important matters should be well enough resolved that everyone can start off on a creative new course without too many constraints from the past.

Of course, this year hasn't been all "observation." A healthy congregational life has been maintained and I

look forward to its continued growth and enhancement in the coming year. This congregation's understanding of its strengths and challenges has been deepened and is growing in such a way that it surely is destined to become even more a voice for free religion and ethical responsibility. In spite of the stresses of transition and the time and energy demands of mounting a building campaign and a ministerial search in the same year(s), competent and inspired leaders continue to step forward. UUCGT is staying the course admirably.

The coming year should be even more productive. The Board has identified at least eleven useful and necessary goals for a second interim year. Their list and my perception of things yet to be done, while not being identical, considerably overlap. One of the first things I intend to do when things start up again in August is to speak as directly and as clearly as I can to these goals. I am looking forward to a truly productive second interim year, one that will make smooth your welcoming of your next settled minister.

Highlights from the Board

The board has proposed goals for the second interim year and is seeking input from congregants.  - ✓ children's story, joys and concerns, money issues, lay-led vs. minister led services
2. Call a settled minister.
3. Engage youth, young adults, young families, new members...leading to growth.
4. Communication: improve flow of information
5. Board members attend more congregational functions.
6. Business processes become clear and efficient.
7. Address various spiritual needs
8. Improve quality of services using strong ministerial leadership
 - ✓ seamless flow among elements of service
 - ✓ continuity of theme across elements
 - ✓ integration
9. Relevant topics for today, without politics
10. Open horizons to people who think differently than we (politically, etc.)
11. Ministers involved in local minister's group...to keep UU in the local loop.

I did a lot of promotion to attract more kids. (Just reminding people we are here worked surprisingly well.) Whenever I picked lessons, I wondered if a kid like Frank would respond to the lesson. When I called for volunteers, I pursued ones I thought could relate to Frank. Whenever policy issues were being discussed, I also asked myself how this would, in the end, affect Frank.

Frank is in the fifth grade now. Soon he will be doing Coming of Age and participating in Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education. And then he will move into our Youth Group. I know

that along the way he has had many positive experiences at the UUCGT and will be a better person for it.

Frank's experiences were formed by many people at many levels – from finance to housekeeping to curriculum development. Clearly the new building addition will affect his life. Even our policymaking ultimately makes a difference for Frank.

As we move into the future I hope we will always be focusing on affecting the experiences of kids like Frank in positive ways.
