INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN

The good news around UUCGT these days is: there is a candidate for senior minister!! From the last Sunday of this month through the first Sunday of May, the Rev. Chip Roush will be here to meet with as many persons and groups as can be crowded into that period. The result of that week should be a clearer idea in this congregation's mind as to who Chip is and in Chip's mind as to who and what make up this congregation. Surely a lot of the conversation will be about organizational dynamics and issues, but more important will be the way ideas and feelings are exchanged and heard.

Having been through several candidating weeks as the candidate myself, I can attest to the importance of encountering not just issues and agendas but persons as well. After all, at root it's a community of persons that Chip will be coming to meet and it's the person of Chip that the community most needs to know.

The reason this aspect of the candidating week looms so large in my mind now probably is because my recent experiences with the Wednesday "Supper at Six" group. When I have met with that group—and especially when I have led the program—the importance of conversation as a prime requisite of community has been reinforced in my

mind. We didn't talk much about "business" or "issues"; rather, we explored and shared ideas, opinions, and feelings. We had a conversation that put us in touch with each other's orientations and values more deeply than problem solving or argument can do.

A great depth of community can exist between persons who communicate on an earnest and sincere level without lobbying or trying to win points. In seminary I experienced this kind of conversation in certain seminars. In churches and fellowships in which I have ministered I have found that the more people could get together to explore ideas honestly and openly, the stronger was the community itself. I have also found that, if such opportunities to converse do not exist, what's thought to be community may be just a bunch of people trying to get their own way. To have community, you have to know one another. To know one another you have to converse—you have to talk meaningfully in ways that reveal values and commitments.

May this congregation have a great conversation with the Rev. Chip Roush. May it have great conversations within itself.

SOCIAL JUSTICE ACTION

Global Warming: The Science and the Signs will be shown at 7 PM on Wednesday April 26 and Friday April 28 This is a documentary that explores what is arguably the most significant environmental phenomenon of the last 10,000 years. The program features numerous science experts who review a growing body of evidence of the grave consequences of a changing climate,

and explores how individuals, communities and organizations across America are creating new approaches to safeguard future generations. The documentary also looks at evidence that human activities are provoking an unprecedented era of atmospheric warming and climatic events: more drought, wildfires and flooding; polar melting; more powerful storms; and more variable weather. Tropical diseases are moving north; childhood respiratory illnesses are skyrocketing; and in the last three decades more than 30 diseases new to science have emerged. Is it possible to avert disaster? Can a paradigm of progress built on fossil fuels be altered significantly in time? Will changing the way things are done mean economic ruin or new opportunities? These are some of the questions the documentary poses.

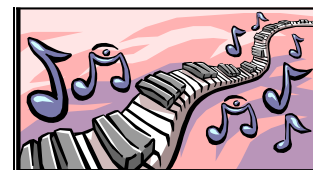
