Midrash—from the Hebrew "darash," to expound—is a process of expansive commentary on biblical text. It is a vehicle for imaginative interpretation of holy stories. In the Jewish tradition, midrash holds the possibility of redeeming omissions (like the silencing of women) and reframing psychologically difficult passages (like the binding of Isaac) in the biblical text.

Following the traditional weekly biblical portion "Korach" (Numbers 16:1 - 18:32)—a story about rebellion against authority—we will explore the possibilities of creating Unitarian-style midrash.

INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN

How would you define a situation when a congregation is locked in with you in an abandoned theater? "A potential lawsuit," said the attorney. "An emergency for the fire department or the police," said the building inspector. "A great opportunity," said the Interim Minister.

Obviously, UUCGT has not been in an abandoned theater these past two years. However, as abandoned theaters are caught between what they were and what they may become, so is a congregation without its long-time minister caught between its past and its future. Such a situation is fraught with opportunity.

That's pretty much where we have been for the past two years as Congregation and Interim Minister. The opportunities to examine what an organized religious society really means to us personally and collectively have been all around us. Many persons have taken the opportunity to delve into the nature and the mission of this congregation. There have been opportunities to tinker with organization. There have been occasions to examine the health of relationships and the limits that healthy relationships impose on us. There have been occasions to celebrate some of the wonderful things we have found, as there have been occasions to ponder where changes need to be wrought. This has been an active and creative period in the life of this Congregation.

In all this we have been reminded that a religious community exists to fill a wide spiritual, ethical, and philosophical area in human life. We have been reminded

that every element of the religious life must be covered if a religious community is to be true to its reason for existence. We have to worship and celebrate together, of course. We have to teach one another—teach our children the basics of religion and life; teach one another by being intellectually engaged with, and responsible to, one another. We have to care for one another and we have to find ways to contribute to the larger community.

The task of an Interim Minister is to remind him/herself of these things and to help the Congregation remember how broad and deep is the enterprise on which it is embarked. However, remembering is only a prerequisite. Some tangible changes may be made during an interim period but the real opportunity to put it all together will come when the new, settled minister arrives. What has been thought through and discussed during these last two years are but a grounding for building a new edifice of the spirit when the Rev. Chip Roush arrives.

Being among you and working with you during this transitional period has been a great privilege. Yours is a great Congregation and I am sure you will continue to enhance one another and contribute leadership to the Grand Traverse area. As we take our leave, Peggy and I take with us many fond memories—and a desire to come back some day and see how you have progressed.

Art In Our Building

A selection of Charly Hansen's art work is decorating the walls of our building right now. Enjoy! The following is a brief description by the artist of his background and work.

I was born into a family of artists and have always known that art would be one of the most important things in my life. Although I've been interested in almost all forms of art, including painting, drawing, sculpture, music, writing and photography, painting is my favorite, and oil painting is what I choose to do now. The painting of the small lake I have hanging here is close to what I plan to paint all this summer. I have loved the water all my life.

I'm showing a couple wall sculptures here of a political nature. These two pieces were done during the first Gulf war. I used a small slip-casting of a Woodstock-like chicken to represent in the one called 'Be all you can be' the soldiers; and in the one with a pulled out drawer to represent civilians killed during the fighting. The officials at the time used the term 'collateral damage' for them, which offended me.

I'm also showing a few of my drawings of the figure. All my life I have been drawing the human figure. Never really thinking that I would be a

'figurative' artist, I find that indeed I am now considered such. We all have a 'figure.' Understanding myself and others has always been important to me, to where for the last ten years I've thought of myself as a student of human behavior. It is through a style of drawing that I most love, which is called 'blind contour,' that I have taught myself to really 'see.' Generally, blind contour is done very slowly and rarely does the artist look at what he or she is drawing. For me, I felt that it relieved me from fear of failure; hey, I wasn't looking so I'm not really responsible for the outcome; which often, because of the slowness along with the intense looking involved produces rather surprising successes. "Try it!" When I teach art this is what I always start with. "Drawing is the root of everything." (Vincent VanGogh.)

The large painting of me in a caged raft on West Bay was painted out of frustration with the way I was painting at the time, which you could call tight 'realist'. I enjoy this style of art but was not enjoying painting in that way. I now paint a lot looser with larger brushes and with less detail depicted. The canvases floating in the waters around me are what I'm painting now, and they are of the water. Did I say how much I love the water?

Below are the volunteer tasks for which we need your help. There is a great variety of jobs that accommodate many talents and time schedules. There is something for everyone whether you have a specific skill or inclination or whether you need a

flexible time schedule or desire more hands-on or prefer a more administrative task.

Long Range Planner

- Develop long range plan for the facilities.
- Master plan for maintenance/repair/replace/budget.

Communication/ Documentation Coordinator

- Document procedures and processes of the Facilities Team
- Call tree for contact list in case of facilities problems.

Contract Administrator

- Monitor and keep service contracts current.

Building Systems Monitor

- Inspect and monitor status of building systems inside and outside.

Lighting Maintenance

Coordinator

- Inspect all lights (inside and

outside) on monthly basis.

- Replace bulbs as necessary.

Snowplow Manager

- Annual snowplow contract.
- Snowmelt and sand containers at entrances during winter.

Lawn care Manager

- Assemble a team that is available to perform lawn cutting and other grounds keeping chores

Irrigation System Manager

- Evaluate and recommend repair of current system

Wall Move and Building Prep Coordinator

- Develop and train a wall move and set-up team.
- Schedule team to move walls in coordination with Building Use calendar

Tools and Equipment

Manager

- Establish inventory of all tools and equipment.

- Storage of tools and equipment

Recycling Coordinator

- Set up designated and labeled containers for recyclables
- Organize recycling and returning the above.

Let me know if you would like more information before you decide which job you'd like to consider. A detailed job description is available for each assignment. The Housekeeping Committee (Joy Platteborze), Kitchen Committee (MaryAnn Force) and Sound System Committee (Ron Yatich) also would appreciate help in their committees.
