May 2007

Trust has been much on my mind lately, especially since I was lucky enough to work with the Youth Group on their superb service. The youth invited the congregation to contemplate trust in its many forms, and the consequences of trust, both positive and negative. If you missed that service, borrow the tape! It’s really thought-provoking.

Trust plays an important role in the life of any congregation, and especially in any Religious Education relationship. You trust me to create interesting, engaging activities to share Unitarian Universalist values and ideas with our children. You trust me to keep our children safe, with competent volunteer teachers who will respect and teach our children well. You trust me to communicate frequently and thoroughly about RE. I am deeply grateful for that trust.

I also trust you, the members and

friends of our congregation. I trust you to support our RE program, to value it, whether or not you have children. I trust you to volunteer to teach classes, or to serve on the RE Committee. I trust you to consider the RE program when voting on our congregation’s budget. And I trust you to come to me with any ideas, questions, or concerns you have.

With this trusting relationship, we can meet the lofty goals I mentioned in this space last month: we can “nurture UU identity, spiritual growth, a transforming faith, and vital communities of justice and love.” In the past month:

- the preschoolers explored diversity in the children’s books *Giraffes Can’t Dance* and *It’s Okay to Be Different*;
- students in grades 1–3 continued with Stories About God, contemplating God’s existence in sound, light, darkness, and in Everflowing Forgiveness;
- the 4th–6th graders kept working with activities designed to help them know themselves, as part of our “Ethics” curriculum;
- the 7th and 8th graders wrapped up their Guest At Your Table event, worked on their “elevator speeches,” and hosted a guest speaker from Radio Anyway;
- the Youth Group planned, wrote, and led a wonderful Worship Service.
- Also, all grades together experienced a Passover Seder, and on Earth Day preschool through 6th grade went outdoors to look for signs of spring!
