The labels—Christian, Jew, Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, humanist, theist and non-theist—are no longer the primary way we define how religion, spirituality, faith, and practice come together. In our quest to bring more love and justice into the world, we find ourselves in partnership with people following different religious and spiritual paths." What makes people creative? What gives some of us the ability to create work that captivates the eyes, minds and hearts of others? Jonah Lehrer, a writer specializing in neuroscience, addresses that question in his new book, *Imagine: How Creativity Works*. Lehrer defines creativity broadly, considering everything from the invention of masking tape to breakthroughs in mathematics; from memorable ad campaigns to Shakespearean tragedies. He finds that the conditions that favor creativity — our brains, our times, our buildings, our cities — are equally broad. (npr.org) How can we be more creative and imaginative as a congregation? Reflection: "Who We Are – Imagine ... Investing in One Another"

Dear UUCGT family and friends -

Let me begin by thanking those of you who reached out and offered such loving care last month as I recovered from surgery. Your cards, calls and texts were such a loving reminder of what our congregational community does: care for one another and make the world a kinder place. I especially want to thank our amazing staff for the support they have offered.

I begin with this thank you because I want to remind us that UUCGT is a **needs-meeting** community.* This congregation **meets the needs** of those who need support in times of illness and loss, in times of celebration and joy. UUCGT **meets the needs** of those who gather on Sundays to reflect, learn and be energized. We **meet the needs** of those who seek community and friendship with like-minded people through ongoing fellowships in music, coffee, suppers, books and yes, beer. Our congregation **meets the needs** of people of <u>all ages</u> who wish to learn, grow and stretch themselves intellectually and spiritually.

Warm greetings from your Board of Trustees. We have been busy over the last two months and would like to take this opportunity to apprise you on our activities. There are so many activities and processes: we will simply provide a list. If you would like to know more, all of our minutes and documents are on our website under Board or you are always welcome to inquire further from any Board member.

- Supported the creation of a standing Music Committee.
- Allocated funds for an accompanist for Vocal Ensemble Rehearsals.
- Refined the job description for Music Director.
- Monitored the progress of the Staff Resources Committee's progress on interviewing for the position of Music Director. Currently initial interviews are in progress and proceeding well.
- Created various "outreach "opportunities including President "office hours" (next held after church on March 6th).
- Supported the work of the Communications Task Group with the assignment of Lorraine Anderson & John Hoffman as liaisons.
- Created a Board policy called "declaration of intent" regarding transparency in our work.
- Reviewed the process of Professional Expenses.
- Implemented a review of all Personnel Policies with the intent of adding the Employee Dispute Resolution that has been drafted and to draft a serious discipline policy.

- Processes are to be created to best support our staff and organization.
- Reviewed the status of our Policy Manual. We have directed Mary Grover, Kay Sturgeon and Karl Love to create a revised policy structure to guide the necessary revision and simplification of our policies.
- Agreed on a process that would complete staff evaluations by the end of April. An evaluation of our Senior Spiritual Leader would also be completed by that time. The president will poll both the trustees and committee chairs (through the program council) regarding the current job description and areas of success as well as opportunities for growth.
- Reviewed our finances and have asked the Finance Committee to take steps to trim expenditures in line with our decreased income. We have already directed some cost saving measures and will continue to monitor our financial position closely.

Our next Board meeting will be held March 14th at 5:30 PM, at UUCGT. All are welcome to attend. Those with business to place before Board consideration should submit their request to a Board member prior to Noon on March 10th.

Social Justice and Action

Last month we talked about racism and how the people of color are so very disadvantaged and persecuted in our society. It continues as bad as in the days of slavery and after the Civil War, but with a different disguise. I remember a good black friend of mine saying that he would rather live in the south than the north. This was years ago. The reason was that at least in the south, he felt he knew where the prejudices and hate were. And now unfortunately, it is all over our nation, prejudice and hate.

We have seen it on TV with the awards that have been given, only to whites. We see it especially in our restriction of voting rights with laws that inconvenience and discriminate against blacks, Hispanics, disadvantaged, and others minorities. This is one way for the moneyed party to keep their power. I like what Cory Booker said: "the power is in the people, not the people in power." We have to use that power in the people and right now!

This election is rigged because so many have lost their right to vote after the remov-

al by the Supreme Court of the Civil Rights Voting Act. Many states took advantage of that and passed new restrictive laws limiting access to vote due to less availability to the polls because many were closed in black neighborhoods and decreased hours that polls are open. Many also passed laws requiring certain identification before one can vote. These identification papers are often difficult to obtain, expensive, very restrictive, etc. Can we reverse those many laws in the next 12 months? Can we? Can we work hard and help those discriminated against get to the polls to vote? We have to! Which side are they on anyway? They are on the side that supports most of our UU principles, the value of each individual. It is interesting to me though; both sides say they are for people's rights and well-being. But some get to it with very different thinking than others.

In our Social Justice Discussion Book Group, we are discussing these issues. We also have been reading a book about how it feels to be black and the warnings parents must give their children, the fear that they must have growing up. Some of us have no idea how different their outlook has to be for survival in our society. It is one of constant defensiveness and being on your guard. How can one develop self-esteem and confidence? And yet many do and succeed well. And then whites tend to look at them as if they are different, uppity and don't belong, stepping outside their boundaries. We have lots to learn to accept each other!

I cannot begin to cover the issue here. Join us in the Social Justice Book Discussion group. We are next meeting Thursday, March 10,at 6 PM, in the basement of Horizon Books downtown Traverse City. We are pondering these thoughts and feelings, learning together. The more we can learn, the more we can hopefully help reverse this terrible discrimination, the blight of racism, in our society.

Seven months into our fiscal year income exceeds expenses. We would ask that you try and keep your pledges current during the winter months, especially if you plan to be out of town for an extended period. As you can tell, our cushion going into the remainder of the year is not as great as it was last year.
